



Happy 75th Diamond Anniversary!



St. Michael's International School, named after the patron saint of Kobe diocese, officially opened on 10th March 1946, on the same site the English Mission School stood since circa 1890, but turned into rubble like two thirds of Kobe city from aerial bombardments. Miss Lea remained in Kobe during that time due to a mix-up in exchange boats which should have carried her back to England. Soon after the war ended, Bishop Yashiro and a group of church people built a church from recycled boards, wire and some nails. Then the rubble was cleared off and a carpenter built a wooden shack for a school with four classrooms. This was the first Christian structure to be rebuilt in Japan after the war.

To the newly erected school, the students of the International and Language Schools, who had been studying at Miss Lea's house in Yamamoto-dori since December 1945, marched on snow-covered roads with their teachers. One of them was Miss Hirose who turned 102 this year. It is most wonderful that the teacher who was at the official beginning of St. Michael's International School on 10th March, 1946, is with us today. Thus, our St. Michael's continues.

In ordinary years, there would have been joyous celebrations by all the School community to commemorate the Diamond Anniversary of the School. However, due to the coronavirus pandemic, almost everything was put on hold. If things return to normal, we shall be able to have a gathering to commemorate the 75th school birthday and remember Miss Lea on her 50th memorial year. She passed away on 28th October 1971.

Meanwhile, Miss Lea's scholarship fund campaign continues. Thank you to all those who have already given their support.

With accreditations awarded by the Council of International Schools (CIS), Western Academy of Schools and Colleges (WASC), Council of British International Schools (COBIS) and the International Curriculum Association (ICA) St. Michael's International School can count itself in the top echelon of international schools both in Japan and around the globe. Using a globally recognised curriculum, our young learners benefit from a balance of academic, personal and international learning opportunities designed to support their development into global citizens. Whilst our curriculum continues to maintain a strong emphasis on the fundamentals of reading, writing and mathematics, the tools available to our teaching team would, to our founders Miss Lea and Bishop Yashiro, be no doubt reminiscent of a science fiction novel or fantasy movie!

Chalkboards have been updated to whiteboards and Smart Boards. Exercise books and textbooks have been replaced with laptops and iPads. In this modern age, scientific and technological innovations have become increasingly important and to succeed in an information-based and highly technological society, our young learners need to develop their capabilities in science, technology and mathematics to levels much beyond what was considered acceptable in the past. SMIS has been responsive to this expectation; the introduction of a 1-1 Chromebook programme in early 2019 has enhanced access to information for all primary children and offers a

myriad of ways for our young learners to demonstrate their knowledge, skills and understanding. Additionally, in the same year, a very generous alumni donation enabled SMIS to develop the much loved and much used ‘*Creativity Zone*’ which, in addition to providing a range of modern science resources for all ages, offers learners and teachers the opportunity to develop their knowledge and understanding of robotics, coding, 3D printing and engineering. I am sure you can imagine the excitement that comes with such learning and how quickly our young learners’ skills have developed through access to such high quality resources.

What has not changed is the school’s well-established mission to maintain a student-centred approach to teaching and learning that encourages positive, supportive relationships between students, staff and parents. Whilst the academics are important, SMIS has always recognised and prioritised the importance of nurturing personal skills and values that will allow our graduates to participate as contributing members of their communities in the future. Aspiring to instill the values of honesty, integrity, respect, responsibility, compassion, tolerance and endeavour, St. Michael’s supports and encourages young learners to become better communicators, collaborators and creative thinkers who are ready to embrace the opportunities and challenges of an increasingly global society. More than seventy-five years after they founded St. Michael’s International School, I believe the vision of our founders, Miss Lea and Bishop Yashiro, remains in safe hands!



The Saturday school also saw its first graduating class of students from its original class entering in 2014. 

Who can recite as many poems as Lynva can?


Who loves dancing as much as Lynva? She once volunteered to dance on a dining table at a restaurant in Harbourland, where the Staff party was held!


