# Tax Benefit from Donation to 70<sup>th</sup> Project -A Case Study-

For some time, I have been writing about the *tokuzo* status that the school has obtained, and how this would lead to tax benefits to the donors to the school. What I could not do, was to let you know the scale of the tax benefits that could be reaped from this scheme.

In the last year, I have made a small donation to the school, and followed that donation to see the magnitude of the tax benefit, so now able to share my experience with you.

Upon making a donation to the school, the school issued a statement summarizing that the donation was made to an institution with the *tokuzo* status. I kept this statement, and submitted this in the *kakuteishinkoku*, the annual ritual to confirm previous year's income and taxes. What I learned, was that I got back 40% of my donation as a tax return, and considering my current financial situation, this was very welcome. Now I don't think I would have been writing this article if the tax return was 5% or 10%. But 40% is quite substantial, and felt that this experience may persuade some of you who are sitting at the fence pondering on whether to donate or not.

But I need to be clear to you that everybody has different tax situations (individual, corporate, etc.), so what I cannot do is to tell you that all the readers can expect the same level of tax return. Please check with your accountant if you are interested in learning more.

However, the message that I wanted to convey, is that the tax benefit from the tokuzo status is real, and by adequately filing the tax returns, you too many be able to claim some tax refund, something I am sure is very welcome.
