At the end of December2016, we bid farewell to Mairi Fraser, who moved back to Scotland after being in the Early Years as a teacher and Early Years' Coordinator for 4 and a half years. As her first article as an alumni, here are Mairi's thoughts and memories of SMIS and Kobe.

In the summer of 2012 I arrived in Kobe a week early to give myself time to settle in and was welcomed by James and Darlene Grimsby. I remember watching the summer fireworks show on one of my first nights in Kobe. As part of a new management team in a new country, Mr Grimsby was a great support to me and my colleagues. He also advised me on arrival that the Kansai St Andrew's Society was short of Scots and introduced me to the group which was the start of what was to



become my 3 years as Chieftain of the Society. Quite a number of the members were also part of the St Michael's community in one way or another.

In my 4 years at SMIS I saw quite a few changes, Early Years became a unit, the inquiry-led International primary curriculum approach and the use of technology to support learning became increasingly embedded across the curriculum, supporting the children of SMIS in becoming 21st century learners. We welcomed great new teachers to the team who have done a great job building on the work of those who went before them. The English language school went from strength to strength and was continuing to add numbers of students to the St Michael's community.

Some of my most striking memories are regarding the continuity St Michael's has with its past and its place in the community of Kobe. I was lucky to have joined the school when 'Michan' was still working there and her smile brightened my days. It was very moving to see her take the stage at the cathedral in the anniversary service for 70 years, representing the earlier days of SMIS and I was glad to get to see her again at the 70th gala ball. Miss Lynva Davies will be a name known to many a SMIS alumni and she was a great source of stories of past events and characters and became a good friend. Mrs Makino initiated us into the history of St Michael's when we first arrived and her passion for learning and for the future of SMIS was inspiring. She was a great help to us negotiating aspects of Japan which could be difficult with no knowledge of the language, and also to some great places to eat delicious Japanese food! Among parents it was lovely to hear some introducing themselves as proud alumnus of SMIS and see their pride and pleasure at their children now attending the same school that they did.

SMIS Bazaar was a great fixture in the SMIS year and I think the food was a great draw for people in the wider community of Kobe. I got to indulge in some of my favourite cuisine, in particular Korean and Chinese; and of course getting to taste delicious Indian vegetarian foods that I would never have got a chance to eat in a restaurant. I was fascinated to find out about the history of the Indian community in Kobe and learning more about the Jain and Sikh religions. After leaving SMIS I went travelling for two months in India. The first part of my travels was a food tour indulging my love of spicy food from Delhi up through Rajasthan down through Mumbai and on to Goa.
